1.1 INTRODUCTION

Sengunthar Arts and Science College was established with the motto of "**Erudition**, **Exertion and Elevation**", in the year 1991 underneath of Sengunthar Education Trust which always aspires to hone the skills of young minds. Our college has been producing successful professionals, entrepreneurs and academicians since its inception.

It is a pioneer, self-financing, co-educational Institution situated in serene green surroundings at Tiruchengode, which was formerly affiliated to the University of Madras and currently affiliated to **Periyar University**, **Salem**.

It has been recognized by UGC, New Delhi under Section 2(f) and 12(B) of the UGC Act, 1956 and accredited with "B" Grade by NAAC. The institution is certified as ISO 9001:2015 Institution by BSCIC. The Institution started with 5 Under-Graduate Programmes with the Student-Strength of 160 in the year 1991 at present, offers 15 Under-Graduate Programmes and 9 Post-Graduate Programmes with the Student strength of 1177 for the academic year 2022-2023.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Our institution follows the Choice based credit system (CBCS) curriculum prescribed by Periyar University, Salem. Before the start of the academic year, the academic calendar is prepared and circulated to all the students and faculty in the form of a booklet. The subject allocation is carried out in each department based on the expertise of the faculty members. The elective courses are offered every year based on the selection by the students. The time table is framed and finalized before the start of every semester. Each faculty prepares the lesson plan for the assigned courses and implements the plan meticulously using various ICT enabled tools.

As a part of academic flexibility and beyond curriculum prescribed by the affiliating University, value added courses are designed by senior faculty members of each department and delivered to the students beyond the working hours. This value added courses helps the students to develop the skills and knowledge in their area of study. Apart from the internship, project work is also offered as a part of curriculum for particular programs, These components are offered by the institution beyond the curriculum to maximum of the students from almost all the programs to enhance their experiential learning. To gain a detailed insight into the course, the students are given guest lectures, seminars, workshops by academic and industrial experts. The cross cutting issues like professional ethics, Gender, Human values, Environment and sustainability are addressed in the curriculum as well as through various environment sustainability awareness and gender equality programmes conducted by the institution.

The performance of the students is evaluated through continuous Internal Assessment and end semester assessment as prescribed by the affiliating university. The students are informed well in advance about the

internal assessment exam dates and syllabus for better performance. Standard Operating Procedure is followed for the conduct of internal assessment and is overseen by the Department Heads, Principal for ensuring the fairness and transparency in the entire process of conduct of internal assessment.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The student's admission is done in the institution admitted in the institution are from rural background and surrounding villages. The Student Teacher ratio is maintained as per norms by the management of the institution. The teaching learning process in the institution inculcates various student centric methods to make the students industry ready. Internships, project work, field visits, seminars, competitions are undertaken by our students to enhance the participative learning, experiential learning and problem solving skills. Teachers use ICT enabled tools in their teaching learning process to improve the overall performance of the students.

Internal assessment related grievances are addressed appropriately through a committee and the grievances are resolved on time. End semester assessment and its related grievances are carried out as per the guidelines of the Periyar University, Salem.

The Course Outcomes (CO), Program Outcomes (PO) as specified in the curriculum are evaluated and its attainment is utilized to measure the learning outcomes of the students. The end semester exam results published by the affiliating university is analysed by the department, discussed in IQAC meetings and appropriate actions are taken to improve the overall pass percentage of the students.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Apart from UG programs, the institution also offers PG, M. Phil and Ph. D. programs in various disciplines affiliated to Periyar University, Salem. The research and innovation culture among the students and faculty is promoted in the institution through Research and Development Cell.

The institution provides the ecosystem for research innovation in terms of infrastructure, computing facilities, eresources subscription in library. The institution Innovation Council (IIC) is active in conducting various programs for the benefit of the students including IPR, Research and Entrepreneurship as per the IIC calendar year and have achieved 3 - star certificate recently.

Our faculty members have acquired funds from Government and Non-Government organizations towards research projects. The students and faculty are motivated to publish research articles in UGC peer reviewed journals and conference proceedings. Few of our faculty members have published books/book chapters in renowned publications and published their research work in the form of patents.

The institution has a vibrant NCC and NSS cell through which various extension and outreach activities are conducted for the benefit of society. Our students are sensitized and involved in various community social services such as blood donation camp, eye camp, COVID-19 vaccination camp, health awareness campaign, tree plantation activities, Swachh Bharat Mission and many more. Various organizations have given letter of recognition, appreciation towards the extension activities.

The students carryout their project work and internship in collaboration with the MoU signed companies. We also have collaboration, linkages for conduct of seminars, guest lectures and our faculty members have

published various research papers in collaboration with faculty of other institutions.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The institution campus is spread across 22.5 acres and has a built up area of 21263 square metres. The institute is equipped with adequate learning resources like classrooms, computer labs, central library, well-equipped research laboratories with sophisticated instruments, seminar halls and auditorium.

To meet the technological demand, 50 classrooms are equipped with ICT enabled tools like LCD projectors, desktops with internet facilities to enhance the teaching learning experience of the students. There are three ICT enabled seminar halls in our institution for conducting seminar, workshop, training programs etc. There are four computer labs with around 220 systems installed with necessary software.

The campus is Wi-Fi enabled with 24/7 internet facilities for students and faculty with a bandwidth of 100 Mbps. The institute updates the infrastructure and learning resources facilities constantly as per the demand and requirements. The campus is under the surveillance through CCTVs installed at prominent locations for safety and security purpose.

The central library is a separate block covering an area of 8104 sq. ft with a seating capacity of approximately 150 students and separate reading area for faculty. Library has adequate volumes of textbooks, reference books, back volumes, journals etc. In our digital library, we have subscription to e-resources like DELNET, N-LIST, NDLI, e-books, e-journals and databases.

The institution has sports facilities for indoor and outdoor games. The indoor game facilities includes table tennis, Badminton, Carom etc. and outdoor games facilities includes Badminton, Basket Ball, Volleyball, Tennis, Football, Handball, Kho –Kho court, Track and field etc.

The Institution has fully furnished Gym with adequate and modern exercise equipment for physical fitness of the students. The college cultural day events and other competitions are conducted in the auditorium with a seating capacity of 800.

There are hostels for boys and girls separately to accommodate over 200 students. The hostel has spacious dining halls with a mineral water plant and medical facilities. Separate canteen facilities for students and staff members is also available.

Towards environment consciousness and sustainability, we maintain a green campus with many ornamental plants, landscaping, trees, separate medicinal garden, rain water harvesting to save water, alternate sources of energy to save energy.

Student Support and Progression

In tune with the vision and mission of the institution, the management of the institution provides scholarships and freeships to the deserving financially weaker section of the students' community to pursue their education. Apart from this the management provides scholarships to students under various categories such as merit, sports, refugees etc. Nearly 35% of our students are benefitted by the scholarships and freeships from Government and Non-Government organizations during last five years.

The institution focusses on building the skills of the students through conduct of various programs such as soft skills, communication skills, life skills etc to meet the requirements of the current industry standards. The guidance for competitive exams and career counselling sessions are also organized for our students through the training and placement cell. Our students are placed in various companies through on campus recruitment and off campus placement drives. Most of our students pursue their higher education in reputed institutions.

The student's grievance including ragging, sexual harassment and its redressal mechanism is transparent and effective. Separate committees for monitoring and redressing student's grievances are formed as per the UGC norms and functioning efficiently.

The institution encourages students to participate in sports and cultural activities organized by the institution and other institutions. Our students have won more than 100 awards/medals for their outstanding performance in regional, national and international level sports activities.

The Institution's Alumni Association is registered and we conduct regular alumni meet. Our alumni contribute to the institution in the form of gifts, books, guest lectures.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The institution was established in the year 1991 and run with a visionary zeal by the Founders marching towards achieving the vision of the institution.

The institution practices Decentralization and Participative management in all its academic and administrative activities. Academic, administrative, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities are planned and executed by conducting regular meetings and frequent interactions with all the stakeholders. The institution functions in compliance with the directions and norms of the statutory bodies and affiliating University.

The functioning of the institutional bodies and committees are in line with the policies and procedures of the institution. The institution provides several welfare measures for both teaching and non-teaching staff and follows a well-structured performance appraisal system.

E-Governance is implemented in the areas of administration, finance, students admission, student support and examination. The management provides financial assistance to the faculty for attending FDP, workshops, conferences. Professional development programs organized in the institution are attended by all the faculty members and also administrative training programs are organized for non-teaching staff. Designated qualified auditing team conducts both internal and external financial audits at regular intervals. The institution has well defined financial management and resource mobilization policies.

The institution has a vibrant IQAC, which monitors and guides the students and faculty towards quality enhancement and maintaining quality culture. IQAC has implemented various quality assurance strategies in academic and administrative aspects of the institution. Ours is an ISO 9001:2015 certified institution.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The institution has a dynamic Internal Women Empowerment Cell (IWEC) that chalks out the gender sensitization action plan and implements the same by organizing various programs related to gender equality.

The safety and security of the students and staff are ensured through security guards, CCTV installed in the campus, fire extinguishers in case of fire accident etc. Common room for boys and girls are provided separately and counselling rooms are available in the campus.

The institution celebrates most of the National, International Commemorative days, Events, Festivals such as National science day, Independence day, Republic day, International women's day, Pongal festival etc.

Green campus initiatives (restricted entry of automobiles, landscaping with trees and plants across the campus, conduct of green environment audit)

Disabled friendly barrier free environment (provision of lifts, ramps, disabled friendly washrooms, appropriate signage boards, NVDA software)

Certified auditor conducts Green Energy Environment on regular basis and various initiatives for environment promotional activities beyond the campus and within the campus such as tree plantation, cleanliness etc are carried out by the institution.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

As our college is affiliated to Periyar University, Salem we follow the curriculum framed by the affiliating University for all the programs offered by the institution. We create a platform for our students towards multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary approach through curricular and co-curricular activities. 2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	Sengunthar Arts and Science College follows a choice-based credit system for all of its Program as per the guidelines of the affiliating University. As an affiliated college, we would implement Academic bank of credits as per NEP 2020 based on the guidelines of affiliating university.
3. Skill development:	We follow the curriculum and guidelines laid down by our affiliating university (Periyar University, Salem). The practical exposure and experiential skills of the students are developed through the laboratory courses, minor projects, major projects and internships as prescribed in the curriculum. Apart from this, the training and placement cell of our college conducts various programs regularly to improve the soft skills, programming skills, life skills, language and communication skills of the students to make them industry ready.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	Based on the demand we have started B.A. Tamil program few years back. Our faculty are encouraged to deliver the lectures in both English and Tamil for better understanding of the concepts by the students. One of the best practices of our institution is "Pournami Kaviarangam" where all the students are encouraged to participate in this contest conducted every month. Through this practice our students have participated and won prizes in tamil shows in media. The institution has taken initiative to celebrate various functions, events towards cultural, regional, linguistic, socio-economic diversities so that harmony among the students is well maintained.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	Our college has initiated and implemented Outcome based education (OBE) as per the affiliating University norms. We have well defined course outcomes (CO) for each course, program outcomes (PO) and program specific outcomes (PSO) for each program. The course outcomes cater to the learning abilities at all level as per Blooms taxonomy. The course outcomes are designed in such a way to align with PO & PSO. The students' performance is measured through evaluation of CO, PO and PSO attainment by means of internal assessment and external assessment methods. The Course Outcome, Program Outcome and Program Specific Outcome are displayed in the institution website and prominent

	places in the college.
6. Distance education/online education:	As our college is affiliated to Periyar University, Salem currently distance education programs are not offered. The COVID – 19 pandemic period has created the necessity to use online platform for teaching learning process. Sengunthar Arts and Science College has used online platforms like Google classroom, Zoom, Google meet to carryout regular curricular activities including conduct of examinations as per the guidelines of the affiliating University. Apart from this we have also conducted various co-curricular activities through online mode. Faculty members are also encouraged to attend various webinars, FDP, workshops to keep themselves updated with the technological changes through online mode. Students and teachers have used the online resources effectively to impart education in online mode.

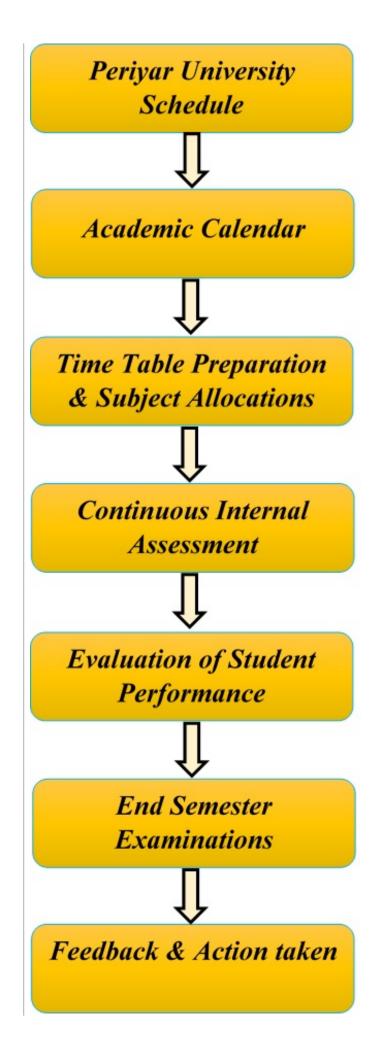

The Institution administers Continuous Internal Assessment tests as per the affiliated University for each semester in order to access the progression of student's learning. Facilitating previous year question papers, which is one of the college techniques, is among the most effective ways to increase a student's success in university examinations.

The academic calendar is prepared by a committee chaired by the Head of the Institution. Government vacations, affiliated University calendars, tentative affiliated University examinations schedules, department activities, and college events are all given highest priority by the committee.

Each semester, the committee ensures a minimum of 90 working days. The Institution calendar contains information such as the reopening day, last working day, holiday list, day order with number of working days, Continuous Internal Assessment examinations, question paper submission dates, Continuous Internal Assessment examinations dates, fees due dates, and so on.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

Response:

Enrichment activities through curriculum

The Curriculum imparted at the Institution educates the students on crosscutting issues through effective delivery of courses relating to Social Concerns, Media Ethics, Professional Ethics, Gender Equality, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability.

The Psychology and Social Work programmes impart courses on understanding human dynamics behaviour and women development.

Besides, the Institution reinforces issues like gender sensitization, environment and sustainability, human values and professional ethics by organizing guest lectures and other programmes periodically.

Professional Ethics and Human Values:

1. Professional Ethics Courses such as Business Ethics, Social responsibilities and Corporate

Governance, Consumer Rights and Education offered by Department of Commerce to develop an understanding on ethical issues in business and good governance practices. Non major elective courses on Consumer Protection and Consumer Rights impart knowledge about Consumer Act. The course on Disaster Management helps to understand the process and mitigation initiatives during Disaster situations.

The Institution has zero tolerance towards unethical practices among students and faculty members. Students are discouraged from engaging in malpractice and ragging by constant surveillance by the regulatory systems. The various courses like Business Law, Income Tax Law and Practice, Auditing,

Organizational Behavior, Indian Polity and Journalism will enable the students to follow the ethics of the profession or vocation concerned.

- 2. Courses on Language and Communication Skills, Life and Managerial skills, Spoken and Presentation skills, Personality Development enhance student's skills in communication, leadership, goal setting, time management and other professional abilities. Related Internships and project work help students to learn and understand professional ethics in practice.
- 1.**Rejuvenation Camps:** Focussing on a healthy functioning of the heart, mind and human body, rejuvenation camps are designed to comprehensively bring out the issues relevant to gender, environment, sustainability, human values and professional ethical issues among students with probable and practical solutions.
- 2.The various social activities organized by the institution like Blood donation camp, Eye camp, Dental camp, adoption of village, Rallies for awareness on Traffic rules and safety through NSS and YRC also contribute to inculcate human values.

Gender Sensitisation:

Through the National Service Scheme (NSS) units, the college carries out activities like Swachh Bharat, life skills development, awareness on disaster management and food adulteration and other field activities which are planned with an emphasis on gender equity, women empowerment, human values, and Indian Culture. Every year, the Women's Development Cell organises seminars and conferences to deliberate on gender related issues.

Environmental Consciousness and Sustainability Related Issues:

- 1.Environmental Studies focuses on the significance of environmental protection, maintenance, management and sustainable development. To enhance the teaching learning process and supplement theoretical knowledge imparted in the course paper, experiential learning is given through field visits to create awareness among students to a play roleon the ecological balance
- 2.The Institution has installed 10 KW (335 Watts Kirloshkar module x 60 Nos) solar panels on the roof tops of the main building. Tube lights are replaced with LEDs and CFLs to save energy
- 3. Water recycling and Rain water harvesting are done to conserve water for environmental protection. Usage of bicycles inside the campus, effective utilization of college buses for transport, and tree plantation are some of the initiatives to make the campus pollution free.

The Institution provides a lot of opportunities to develop their skills, knowledge, attitude and values in proper manner

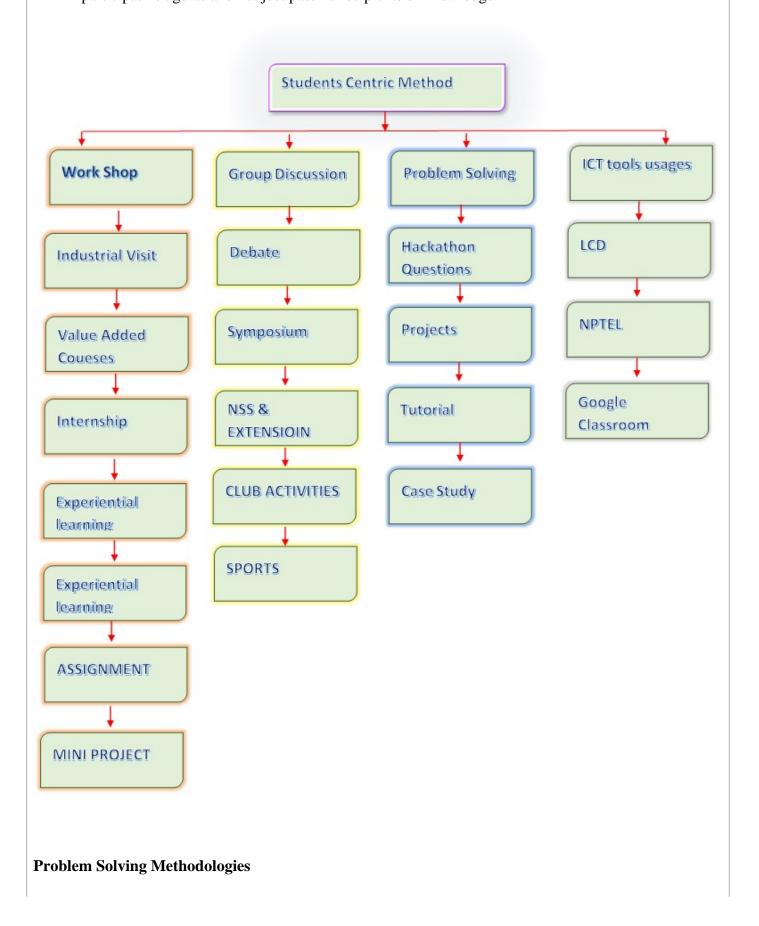
Experiential learning

- The students also take active part in organising various extra and co-curricular events which help them in developing their management skills. Special programs on Independence Day, Republic day, Women's day etc. are also conducted by them.

Participative learning

- In participative learning, the students are given certain topics which are of utmost importance both academic and practical.
- Students undertake group activities such as Project Assignments, Case-Study analysis which leads to participative learning. The learning outcomes of these activities are discussed and shared with the entire class.
- Industrial Visits/Tours- Faculty members arrange industrial visits/tour for the students every semester according to their handled subjects

- Professional Counsellors are employed to enhance the learning process by supporting them with their personal and professional concerns, if any.
- Special lectures, seminars, conferences are organized to encourage and motivate students to become participative agents and not just passive recipients of knowledge.



- The Institution adopts Student Centric Learning Method. Along with the classroom teaching and laboratory experiment based learning, students are also involved in minor and major projects. The projects help towards enhancing the real life problem solving abilities of the students.
- The college further follows Problem Solving Methodologies by challenging the students with assignments on regular basis to check their level of understanding on the subject. 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

The schedule for Monthly Tests, Model Examination and Assignments are published in the Academic Calendar, which is available long before the start of academic year

Internal Examination

The Internal Examination schedule is set at the start of the semester in the form of an academic calendar. The evaluation technique consists of Internal Examinations held during the semester to check and report on the student's periodic performance. The concerned subject teacher keeps the record of all Internal exams, e.g., Monthly-I & II Exam and Model Exam. This strategy is also useful for the development of a student's personality. After displaying the student's examination papers, the student's copy is maintained in the Internal-Examination Cell. In the same session, the result analysis can be observed and copied. Both UG & PG classes, a student has to attend the internal examination compulsorily. There is no exemption. The Internal marks are sent to the university to add in the semester mark-sheet.

Practical Examination

Evaluation is done with transparency based on different parameters like Teachers Assessment, Practical Records, Performance and Viva-Voce.

Assignments

Assignment questions are discussed with students. The students submit three assignments to the concerned class faculty members.

Internal/external examination related grievances

For Examination and Evaluation, the institution has devised a time-bound system. An Exam Cell is responsible for dealing with examination-related difficulties in Internal Exam. The Examination Cell is supervised by Control of Examination for Internal Examination. Internal Exams, such as monthly Exams, are scheduled after a significant amount of coursework has been completed, such as one and half units of the topic. The Examination Cell is responsible for Internal Examinations, and its Department coordinator works with HODs to draw up Internal test papers and evaluate exams. Internal exam answer scripts are handed over to students for personal verification. After this procedure has been completed, no additional changes will be considered. The institution has set a deadline of one week to finish all of this work. Any grievances related to the Internal Exams are brought to the notice of the concerned teacher and get clarified. Through the description of the evaluation, the teacher must satisfy, convince the student. A proper communication is sent to university through college when there are any grievances related to mark statements and certificates. Our university will communicate with us and we can do welfare to the students.

The Attainment of Programme outcomes, program specific outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by two methods.

1. Direct PO & PSO Assessment Process

a. Direct Course Assessment

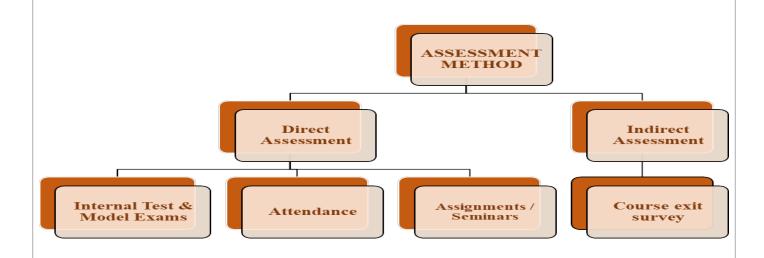
Direct attainment of CO is measured in the scale of 0 - 3 level.

Internal Assessment

Students are assessed based on different activities such as Assignment, Tutorials, Quiz Puzzles,etc.,. Internal Examination question papers are defined with CO for each question. On completion of Internal Assessment (CIA), marks scored by the students CO wise are averaged up. CO attainment is calculated by considering 90% of CIA test level and 10% of activities level. CO attainment is met which is based on the students achieving the defined target.

External Evaluation

Since end semester University examination evaluation is not available CO wise, total mark is considered for CO Attainment. CO attainment is calculated based on the students achieving the defined target. Direct attainment of CO is calculated by considering 75 marks of university Examination level and 25 marks of CIA Level.



b. Indirect Course Assessment:

- 1. Course Exit Surveys are carried out ,where students give feedback in the scale of 1 to 5, are summed up in the proportion of 80:20 respectively. Final course wise PO and PSO Attainment: For attainment calculation, Average of Direct CO PO attainment data from CO PO correlation matrix is collected for all courses and Indirect Course Assessment are summed up in the proportion of 80:20 respectively.
- 2. Indirect Method for PO and PSO Attainment: Program Exit Survey collected from students who are going to graduate at the end of the sixth/fourth semester. Final Attainment for PO PSO Attainment: Sum of Final course wise PO and PSO Attainment and Indirect Method for PO and PSO Attainment in the proportion of 80:20 respectively. If PO and PSO attainment level is measured on a scale of 0-3, where 0

being low and 3 being high level of attainment.

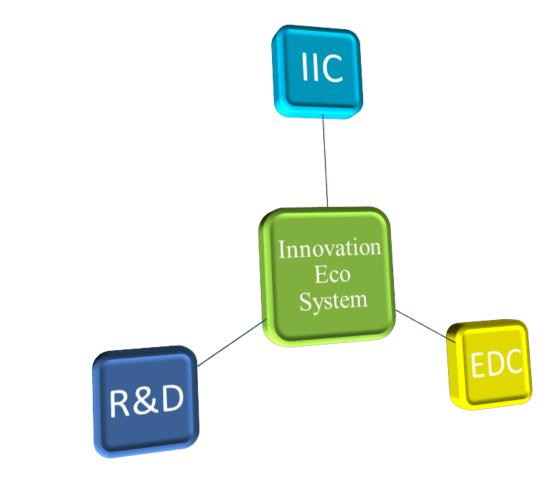
Institution Innovation Council

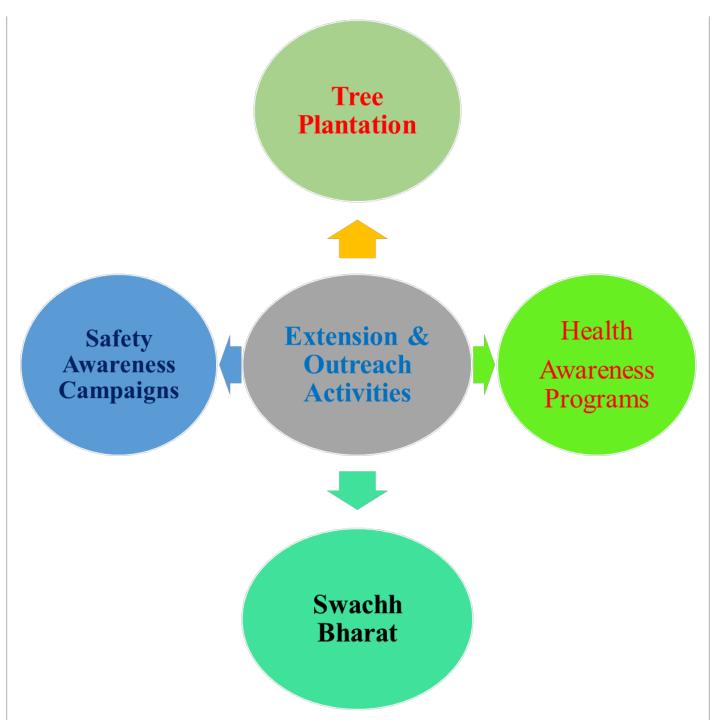
3.4 Extension Activities

The institution has the required learning resources like classrooms, computer lab, and Department libraries, well equipped research laboratories with sophisticated instruments, seminar halls and auditorium. The campus is Wi-Fi enabled with 24/7. Internet facilities with 100Mbps provided to the students and staff. The institution updates the infrastructure and learning resources facilities with the demanding requirement.

Classroom:

There are 58 classrooms in which some of the classrooms are exclusively allotted to various departments. Most of the classrooms are equipped with ICT facilities.

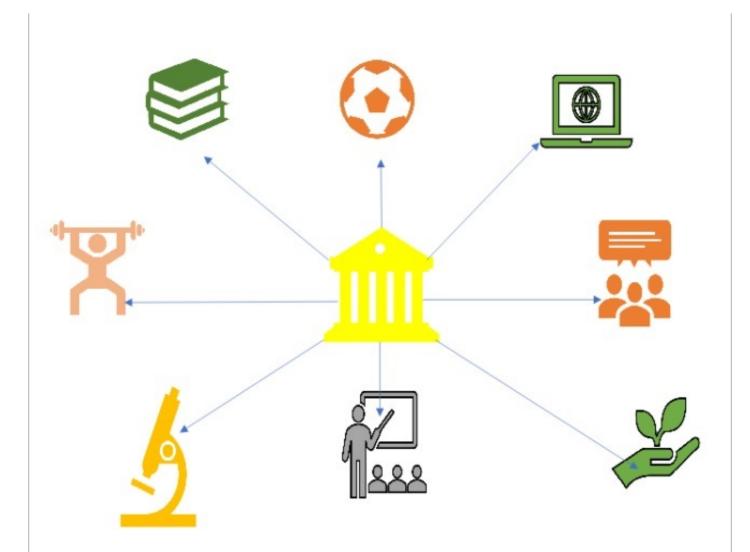
Laboratories:

Computing with ICT facilities:

The institution has 4 computer labs with the repository of 227 desktops and 15 laptops in these labs and departments. These labs are well equipped with internet connectivity. All systems are connected to 100 Mbps broadband internet through LAN connections. The campus is under the surveillance of 24 CCTVs installed at strategic locations. Wall mounted projectors are also available inside the campus for the benefit of the students.

Library:

The Institute organizes CASCADE an Annual meet, Youth Day, Women's Day, National Science day etc to inculcate the cultural aspects.

Sports:

The Institution has sports facilities for indoor and outdoor games. The institute has indoor game facilities such as table tennis, Badminton, Carom, Chess etc. and outdoor games facilities such as sports Basket Ball, Foot ball, Volleyball, Tennis, Hand ball, track and field etc.

Gym:

The Institution has fully furnished Gym with adequate and modern exercise equipments and gadgets like Dumbbell, Pull-up, Bench press, Leg- Extension, Squad rack, Weight lifts, etc.

Yoga:

A sophisticated yoga hall is facilitated by the college for the students to develop their physical strength and fitness.

Hostels:

There are 2 separate hostels for boys & girls to accommodate over 200 students of UG, PG & Research students. The hostel has spacious dining halls with a mineral water plant and medical facilities.

The institution provides free Wi-Fi facility to the students. They can access internet freely through their Mobile phone, Tablet or Laptop in the College campus.

In the institution has 227 computers are available for the students at various Laboratories and facilities. Every Department has laptop and desktop for their technical needs. The staff rooms are either provided with LAN or Wi-Fi facility to enhance the Teaching - Learning Process. The library also enabled with Wi-Fi facility.

The operations of the Administration and Finances are completely computerized thus facilitating timely reporting and efficient resource allocation. Administrative Section has 7 computers with Wi-Fi facility made available for day today office use. The library is equipped with 10 Computers. The institution is under CCTV surveillance with 24 cameras lie Entry/Exit Gates, Block entrance, Corridors, Gym, Open stage and Library. In future the classrooms also equipped under CCTV surveillance.

Classwise WhatsApp groups have been created for the interaction with the students regarding various updates on class timings/notes, library notices, syllabus updation and other notices on important events.

- Recruitment is normally done twice in a year during May and November.
- If need arises recruitment is done by conducting direct interviews or by the written test by the interview committee
- Pay for the selected candidates is fixed by the selection committee as per the pay scale approved by the Governing Council for the respective post based upon the qualification and experience of the candidate.
- All employees are eligible for 12 days of casual leave per year during the year from 1st January to 31st December.

- Vacation Leave (VL) is applicable to only the members of the Faculty (teaching staff) with eligible service.
- After one year complete the staff members are eligible for 6.5 days of earned leave per year.
- Any Leave availed in excess of the prescribed limit shall be deemed to be Leave on Loss of Pay (LOP).
- Woman employee of the institution is eligible for Maternity Leave (ML) as per Government Norms
- OD will be granted when staff members are required to go out on official duties or to participate in seminars, etc. as approved by the Principal.

Appraisal for the Teaching Staff

The college follows a systematic **Performance Appraisal System** for teaching and non-teaching staff. The Institution evaluates teachers based on teaching, research and participation in development activities and due importance is given to all the activities. The institution evaluates non-teaching staff based on performance in technical work and administration related activities, co-curricular, professional, development related activities, academic contributions, general conduct and qualities.

The Self-Appraisal Report (SAR) of all teaching staff is taken twice in a year using structured questionnaire. Based on the performance and feedback, the Principal takes personal interest in guiding the teachers.

The appraisal reports are analyzed and discussed with individual staff members. Major decisions are taken based on these appraisals.

The Heads of the Departments evaluate these self-appraisal forms and give suitable recommendations to the Management which in turn is evaluated by the Principal and the Secretary before arriving at decisions regarding the appraisal.

Appraisal for the Non-teaching Staff

The Principal and the Administrative Officer observe the performance of the Non-Teaching staff. They discuss their opinions and views with one another and try to appraise their performance. Appreciation is given to high performers and counseling is offered to those who lag behind.

The Management evaluates the faculty members and staff by merit rating based on their performance during the period of evaluation. They are recognized and awarded for academic performances, research proposals, consultancy, patents and publication during the Annual Day function each year. In addition, the salary revisions periodically are based on the performances indicated by results, project guidance's, peer reviewed publications, funded research, patents developed, recognition by professional bodies and contribution towards achieving institutional goals in case of non – teaching staff. The above methodology of merit rating has helped the institution to identify and reward meritorious employees and to positively motivate them.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

Financial Audits

Audits of the institution are carried out regularly by our internal audit firm. After a study of the report, the management instructs the concerned section to rectify the errors to set right the audit objections.

The external audits are done by the office of the Accountants General as per the government norms and rules. The objections mentioned in the report are communicated to the concerned sections for immediate rectifications.

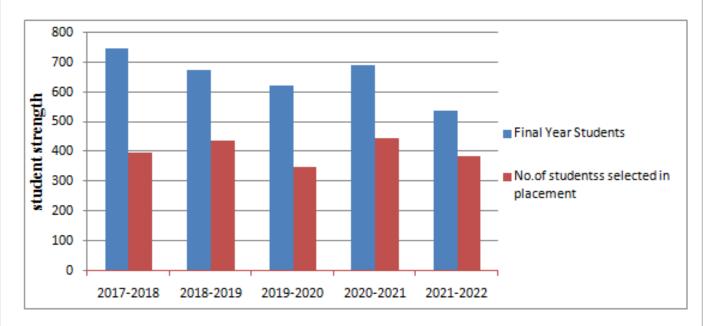
- Training to transcend in a conductive learning environment that ensures to achieve employability quotient with quality job placement after the completion of the course.

The Taluk Government Hospital (Tiruchengode) is located nearer to the college. The patients from the different areas of the taluk come for treatment to GH. The college made publicity through students, staff, alumni, parents and other well wishers of the institution to approach the institute for voluntary blood donation in needy time. This activity is monitored by the YRC of the institution. Whenever any person in need of blood approaches the college, the Principal announces to the convener of YRC about the details of the required blood group along with the status of the patient. Any one of the students or staff members will

respond immediately to the announcement and help the patients by donating the blood voluntarily. The beneficiaries express their heartfelt thanks to the Principal, YRC convener and donors. It gives utmost satisfaction to all the stakeholders of the Institution as this is a life saving donation.

5. Evidence of Success:

With this practice the most benefited group is accident people. Also the patients suffering from various diseases like heart problem, cancer, kidney problems, dengue fever and surgeries for different problems including pregnant ladies are benefited through this programme. As Govt hospital Tiruchengode is nearer to college, the students and staff members are ready to help in emergency situations by their voluntary blood donation.
